The Sundays in Advent will be filled with story and song, with the choir singing the carols of the season as the Advent candles are lit and God's Word is proclaimed. We will join with faithful Christians around the world to ponder the story of Jesus' birth and then act in faith to embody Jesus' words and actions. Together we will work so that the lowly are lifted up, the mighty are brought down, the hungry are fed, and the imprisoned are set free; those who mourn shall dance, and the meek will inherit the earth, that all may know God's jubilee!

Join us on Sundays in Advent to hear this story that has sustained the generations of the faithful for over 2,000 years. Join us as we welcome the Light of the World into our hearts again. Join us as we discover anew the power of God, for whom nothing is impossible ... even peace, even love. Welcome the Christ child into your hearts and lives. Christmas Eve services will be held on Wednesday, December 24th. The Candlelight Service of Lessons and Carols begins at 7:30 p.m. in the beautiful sanctuary, lit in starlight. Co-Pastor Maria LaSala will proclaim God's glad tidings that "to us, a Son is given." The Choir will sing, and all will delight in Christmas carols and in hearing again the words of prophets and Gospel writers telling the wondrous story of Christ's birth. A second service will take place at 11:00 p.m. for those who wish to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Join us in the to hear good news of great joy and to be refreshed in body and in spirit.

May God's blessings be known during this joyous season. Rejoice! For God comes, powerful to save.

The Fourth Sunday of Advent – “The little children will lead us”

Children and Youth will proclaim the Scriptures and lead us in worship on the Fourth Sunday of Advent, December 21st. This is always a delightful morning as the Advent texts come alive in a new way, shared with the wonder and trust of the children and youth in our midst. The Children and Youth Choir will sing, the younger children will perform the play “Nothing Will Be Impossible” written and directed by Martha Smalley, and all will know the joy of God’s coming. All children and youth participating should arrive that morning at 9:30 a.m. to rehearse. This rehearsal will take the place of Sunday school classes for elementary, middle school, and high school groups on that morning.

Music During Advent

Music will again fill our sanctuary in the Advent and Christmas seasons. On the Third Sunday of Advent, December 14, the choir will present its annual Christmas program during the sermon time of the morning worship service. The music will take us from Advent into the Christmas season: from the spiritual “Keep Your Lamps Trimmed and Burning,” to a chorus from Handel’s *Messiah* (“Lift Up Your Heads, O Ye Gates”), to a Renaissance Christmas motet, Luca Marenzio’s “*Hodie Christus Natus Est*, to English carols in both traditional and modern settings, and much more. The program will close with a joyous eight-part motet from the German Reformation, Andreas Hammerschmidt’s “*Freuet euch, ihr Christen alle*” (“Rejoice, All Ye Christians”). Come join us for a festive musical celebration, and for the Christmas dinner to follow in the Miller Gathering Hall.

Advent Communion



The Sacrament of Holy Communion will be offered each Sunday during the season of Advent. On December 7th, the Sacrament will be celebrated during the worship service. On Sundays, December 14 and 21, all who wish to receive the sacrament are invited to come to the front of the sanctuary to stand around the Table following the Postlude. There, prayers will be offered, the bread and cup shared, and another benediction given. This is a wonderful opportunity to continue your morning of Advent prayer and reflection.

Sanctuary Work Group

The First Presbyterian Church sanctuary space has been transformed for Advent. In addition to the familiar greening of the church, the banners that hang above the pulpit have been removed. During the seasons of Advent and Epiphany, a lone 62 point Moravian Star will hang high in the worship space. After that, for a season, the space will be without other artwork.

The temporary changes are part of the work of a new Sanctuary Work Group, charged by the Session with the task of envisioning how visual art might continue to enhance our worship of God in the church. The banners, designed by the artist Andrea Moore, were installed in 1994. The intense sunlight coming through the windows has caused the beautiful art work to buckle and fade. If, after a time without the banners hanging at the front of the church, it is determined not to return them to that space, another suitable use will be made of them – perhaps hanging them in the Owens Community Building in an appropriate way.

When you are next in worship, enjoy a renewed sense of awe about the space, and reflect on how God might be glorified by the use of fabrics, lighting or other artwork in a new creation. Then share your ideas with Bruce Peabody, who chairs the Sanctuary Work Group, or other members, who include Andrew Forsyth, Susan Asher, Becky Cline or Katharine Arnold Luce.

Letter from Interfaith Cooperative Ministries

November 21, 2014

Dear ICM Members and Affiliates,

It is with deep sadness that the Board of Directors has determined that it is time to conclude the work of the Interfaith Cooperative Ministries. The past several years have been a time of discernment for the Board in determining what we can offer as an interfaith ministry to greater New Haven. The continuing need for interfaith understanding and communications is evident. Nevertheless, in dialogue with local clergy, it is clear that the energy and light that once guided the way for ICM is no longer accessible.

The history of this organization has been long and fruitful. At its incorporation as the Downtown Cooperative Ministry in 1973, DCM committed to “join members together in a cooperative effort to provide programs, services and ministries to all individuals regardless of race, creed or color in response to human needs, and to strengthen programs, services and ministries presently existing.”

As a member or affiliate organization, your faithfulness to the work of what is now called Interfaith Cooperative Ministries has transformed the lives of many greater New Haven residents by creating opportunities for improved living conditions, for rich lives of service for staff and volunteers of organizations supported by ICM and authenticity to the practice of one’s faith.

At this time, the Board of ICM is in the process of determining the best disposition of our remaining assets. Once the Board of Directors has developed a strategy for disposition, we will call a Meeting of Members for acceptance. Please hold us in your prayers.
