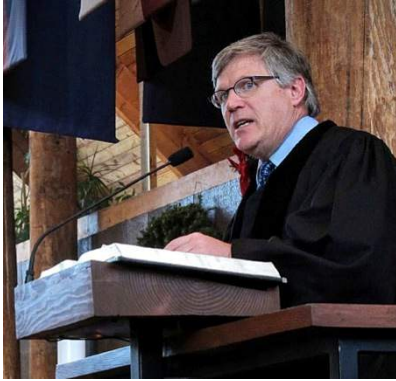

Co-Pastors Bill Goettler and Maria LaSala to end First Presbyterian Church ministry this month

This month Co-Pastors Bill Goettler and Maria LaSala bring their nearly 18 years of ministry at First Presbyterian Church of New Haven to a close. Sunday, June 7th will be a day of rejoicing and thanksgiving. Just as they did when they first preached at First Presbyterian Church as candidates, Bill and Maria will share the sermon. They will be joined in worship leadership by the children and youth of the congregation and by the First Presbyterian Church Choir.

Following worship, a celebratory event will take place in the sanctuary, and then everyone is invited to stay for the church picnic. Burgers (both meatless and meat) and hot dogs will be on the grill. Plan to bring a side dish, salad, or dessert to share. Let's hope for sun, but rain or shine, we will have a chance to enjoy one another's company.

Much has changed over these past 18 years and much has remained the same. While some who were in the pews back then have moved on, many more have come and made a home in the beautiful sanctuary on Whitney Avenue. We no longer have to stand shoulder to shoulder during the Friendship Hour, thanks to the Owens Community Building, built ten years ago.



First Presbyterian Church is a strong and healthy congregation. The Word of God is read and proclaimed. The community continues to grow and find new and wonderful ways to come together to eat, laugh, pray, and serve God and God's people. It is a time to give thanks, to celebrate, and to ask for God's continued blessings during this season of transition.

June 21st will be Maria and Bill's final Sunday in worship with us. This service, beginning at 9:30 a.m. will include a special liturgy of separation, thanking God for these years of shared ministry. A special meeting of the congregation will follow the morning's worship to formally end the pastoral relationship between Maria and Bill and the First Presbyterian Church of New Haven. And then all are welcome to stay for the church Friendship Hour delighting in one another's company. Praise God from whom all blessings flow!

On June 28th we will move to the Owens Community Building for the remainder of the summer. Sunday services will begin at 9:30 a.m. followed by a Friendship Hour. After worship, the space will be transformed from a worship space to a gathering hall ... with your help.

On June 28th, Mission Co-Worker Karla Koll will be the first of many guest preachers. Karla has been serving as a Professor of Theology throughout Central America. Most recently she was in Guatemala. These days Karla is teaching and living in Costa Rica, but continues to travel throughout Central America to meet with students studying to become pastors. Following the Friendship Hour, Karla will offer a presentation about her work and about the challenges ahead for mission co-workers even as they continue to spread the good news of the gospel in Central America and around the world.

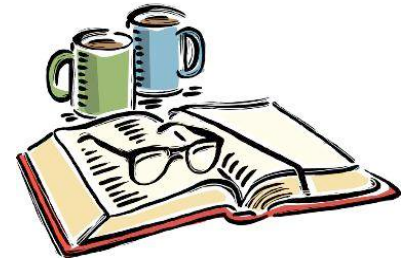

At a special meeting of the Session, the Session elected an Interim Pastor Nominating Committee. Andrew Forsyth is the chair of this committee. Scott Funston, Elizabeth Gill, Candice Gray, and David Miller are the other members of the committee. The Rev. Susan Trucksess will be the Presbytery of Southern New England's Committee on Ministry's liaison to the search committee. Please keep the Interim Nominating Committee in your prayers.

“Traveling Stories” is the Summer Preaching theme

This summer, as in summers’ past, preachers from our congregation will lead the people of God at First Presbyterian Church in worship. The theme this summer invites preachers to take the community of faith on a journey. Using scripture lessons from the bible about the traveling stories of God’s people, each preacher will reflect on the ways God calls people to be on the go, to be open to new experiences, to rest secure that God’s love is everlasting. Worship begins at 9:30 a.m. each Sunday, in the Miller Gathering Hall, followed by a Friendship Hour.

July 5, The Rev. Arthur Shippee, preaching. Arthur has preached at First Presbyterian Church in the past, sings in the choir, and even takes care of the plants in our sanctuary building. The Rev. Shippee and The Rev. John Sandel will preside at the Communion Table.

July 12, The Rev. Mary Thies, preaching. Mary is a former pastor of First Presbyterian Church. She left First Presbyterian Church, New Haven to become co-pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Stamford. Mary is honorably retired, now serving as chair of the Presbytery’s Committee on Preparation for Ministry.

July 19, Elder Andrew Forsyth, preaching. Andrew is a doctoral student in Christian Ethics at Yale University and a current member of Session. Andrew is also the chair of the Interim Pastor Nominating Committee.

July 26, Christopher McCloskey, preaching. Christopher, a member of First Presbyterian Church, has just completed his second year of theological studies at Princeton Theological Seminary. This summer he is a CPE resident at Bridgeport Hospital.

August 2, The Rev. John Sandel, preaching. In addition to serving as the Summer Interim Pastor at First Presbyterian Church, John is a clinical psychotherapist at the Milford Pastoral Counseling Center. John will also preside at the Communion Table that morning.

August 9, The Rev. Diane Goudreau, preaching. Diane has been a member of the First Presbyterian Church community for many years. Diane was ordained in this congregation and each summer is invited to share God’s good news.

August 16, Alison McKinney, preaching. Ally, a new member of the congregation, is entering her third year in the M.Div. program at Yale Divinity School. Ally is a lawyer, with international human rights experience, having lived in Uganda for many years.

August 23, Bruce Gordon, preaching. Bruce is a Professor of Ecclesiastical History at Yale Divinity School. He has led many Adult Education series at First Presbyterian Church, as well as the Men’s Breakfasts.

August 30, Michal Beth Dinkler, preaching. Michal Beth is a candidate under care of the Presbytery of Southern New England. She is Assistant Professor of New Testament at Yale Divinity School.

May Session Update

As Clerk of Session, I attend all Session meetings, observing and documenting the discussions. Here, then, are my observations from Session's most recent meeting, held on May 19. Overall, while Session's regular responsibilities continue, much attention is also being given just now, as you would expect, to working toward the nomination of a new pastor and to ensuring full pastoral cover in the meantime. In addition to the co-pastors and Session members, Rev. John Sandel, our summer interim pastor, also attended the meeting.

As at every meeting, Session received reports from all the committees of the church, reports that often include announcements – some selected highlights follow – of the provision of meals for the parents of new babies (from CLOC), the repair of the sanctuary skylight (from Property), the funds of \$2,240 raised from the congregation by the Walk against Hunger (from Mission), website development (from "Telling our Story"), and high attendance in the nursery that requires the appointment of additional staff (from Christian Education).

Summer activities were a prime concern, from the provision that each member of Session will act as a contact for one week, with her or his principal responsibilities in ensuring the set up for Sunday worship and the securing of the building at the end of the day – to the summer preaching schedule and payment of the summer interim pastor.

Session was also alerted to a potentially worrying development for mission activities. The PC(USA) has resolved to end central funding for missionaries, who will instead raise their own support. This new method may leave congregations facing decisions for which they feel untrained. The mission committee is following this issue, which they recently explored with Revs. Mary Nebelsick and Paul Mathany, good friends of FPCNH serving in the Philippines.

Session also heard of the recent resignation of Jeff Owens, who has cleaned the church for some fourteen years. Jeff's other work commitments have made it very difficult for him to schedule his cleaning. The property committee, headed by Elder Bob Frew, has taken on the challenge of finding a replacement.

Our co-pastors left the room while Elder Andrew Forsyth, chair of the Interim Pastor Nominating Committee, reported to Session. That committee is working hard to assemble all the paperwork required for the advertising of the interim post. Eager to keep the process moving, Session agreed that additional meetings may be needed this summer.

Let me end on two individual notes that speak to the health and joys of our community. Session heard that two members of the congregation, Christopher McCloskey and Michal Beth Dinkler, were approved as candidates for ministry at the most recent Presbytery meeting, and Session approved the baptism of Harris George Wallman.

Service Project with local Family Services Agency

As part of its effort to stabilize families, Families in Crisis has programs to provide children with some of the things we take for granted—Christmas and birthday gifts and backpacks at the start of the school year, for example.

Correspondence from Pakistan/Mission Update

Below is a letter recently received from Friends of Forman Christian College, Pakistan. Last year, our Mission Committee directed church funds to help furnish the new women's dorm. Forman Christian College is a school founded by the late Rev. Dr. Charles Forman's grandfather and supported by the PCUSA.

May 20, 2015

Dear First Presbyterian Church,

I've just returned from Pakistan where the women of Hope Tower Class of 2015, invited me to attend their graduation celebration. Jim and Beth Tebbe, Robert Johnson and I enjoyed their skits, singing and of course, Pakistani dancing! Afterwards, I had a "behind the scenes" tour of Hope Tower and joined the ladies' "after party" where we danced, exchanged jewelry and laughed into the evening.

I'm happy to report that the furnishings you helped fund are in place and, with the exception of washers and dryers that should come soon, Hope Tower is 100% furnished. Astoundingly, the purchasing department in Pakistan was able to accomplish everything under budget. Thanks to this careful stewardship, I can now invite you to rededicate your past gift for Hope Tower to the Forman Advance Fund, which benefits women at Forman in many ways.

Twenty-five percent of the 1,200 women on campus receive scholarships, much of it from the Fund. This year, the Fund will raise up to \$200,000 for new campus security systems that directly benefit women. Women's safety will benefit exponentially from new lighting, emergency text messaging and camera systems. Forman's Student Life department maintains a zero tolerance policy for gender harassment—harassment is quite common on other campuses and its absence is one reason we've grown to 34 percent women!

Again, thank you for all you do for Forman—your gifts, prayers and spreading the good news of our mission in Pakistan rewards us every single day.

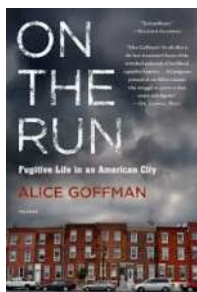
Memorial Cairn – June 1
