Interim Pastor to Start on September 20th

The Reverend Susan Dee Reisinger has been hired by the Session to serve as interim pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of New Haven, beginning on Sunday, September 20. As interim pastor, Susan will have two main sets of responsibilities. The first is the familiar ministry of the Presbyterian pastor: Susan will lead worship, celebrate the sacraments, moderate the Session, lead the staff, and provide pastoral care. The second is particular to interim ministry: Susan will help prepare the congregation for the future, challenging us to reflect on our past, think deeply about our current needs, and, God-willing, see visions and dream dreams as we search for a new pastor.

"Much of my professional life has been dedicated to interim ministry," says Susan. "The threshold between what has been and what might be can be a rich time. This richness lies in saying goodbye to some of what was, and beginning the process of welcoming what is to come. For me it is a great privilege to walk with a congregation during such a pivotal time. I am looking forward to partnering with First Presbyterian Church for the next part of this journey."



Susan has extensive experience as an interim pastor. She has served eleven congregations in an interim role—some with 100 or 200 members, some with 1000s, in small towns, in college towns, in suburban and rural and urban settings—most recently the Presbyterian Church at Hammonton, New Jersey. A philosophy graduate of Franklin & Marshall College, she attended Princeton Seminary and was ordained in 1979. She received a further master's degree from the Seminary, in pastoral care, in 1988.

"We conducted a wide-ranging search," says Andrew Forsyth, chair of the Session's interim pastor nominating committee. "Scott Funston, Elizabeth Gill, Candice Gray, David Miller, and John Sandel have spent their summer months reading applications, meeting together, and thinking about First Presbyterian Church's needs and opportunities. We had nearly thirty applications, and interviewed five. Several of the applications were very strong, but Susan stood out because of her commitment to interim ministry, her desire to work in a diverse and welcoming congregation like our own, her warm personality, and her passion for worship, preaching, and pastoral care."

The Reverend John Sandel, who has served as the *interim* interim over the summer, adds "Susan impressed us with her sure grasp of the nature of interim ministry, her embrace of the progressive character of our congregation, and the grounding of her ministry in spiritual practice and discipline. Her references were uniform in praising her pastoral skills and her gifts for interim ministry."

This is an important and exciting time for First Presbyterian Church. Come to adult education at 9:30 am on Sunday, September 20 to welcome and learn more about Susan.

Reisinger, who will be called to First Pres on September 20, to plan work on the manse before her arrival, and to discuss how to welcome her to this community. Sessions' collective delight (and relief) at having reached this stage quickly and with such a positive outcome was very evident.

And the regular work of the church continues as seen in the committee reports. Plans for the September BBQ were discussed, along with the practicalities of accommodating the Elm City Girls Choir for their lock-in the night before they sing at worship. Christian Education reported on the "movement" theme for the children of the congregation, and Mission reminded Session of the upcoming discussions of Alice Goffmann's, *On the Run: Fugitive Life in an American City*. And Property has plans to tackle the weeds.

Every meeting of Session is framed by prayer and introduced with a devotion. This month Elder Candice Gray talked of how we can find God in elements of our daily life that seem at first so minor, perhaps even unwanted. Her personal account surely struck echoes in the lives of all of us present.

What Are Our Youth & Children's Programs Really About?

Based on both the wisdom of the Yale Youth Ministry Initiative's June 2015 intensive course and the words and works of education reformer Ken Robinson, the Christian Education Committee would like to begin this year by explicitly stating our concrete goals in each of our program areas. What kind of learning and growth do we expect at a given time—especially when the programming is or appears unstructured? Why do we differentiate these four areas at all, and what purposes do they serve for the members and visitors of our church?

Goals of the NURSERY are for children (ages 0-5) to...

- 1. Sense they belong in the community
- 2. Build interpersonal and conflict-resolution skills
- 3. Practice listening to stories and reading solo
- 4. Explore at will without a set curriculum
- 5. Play outdoors on a safe and supervised playground
- 6. Share time with or experience time away from parents/guardians, at the adults' discretion
- 7. Develop a connection with Naomi and Emily as their consistent caregivers and with volunteers

Goals of SUNDAY SCHOOL are for children and youth (ages 5-18) to...

- 1. Learn scripture, church history, and faith/life skills
- 2. Cultivate friendships and learning partnerships regardless of age
- 3. Collaborate for group learning
- 4. Apply lessons to projects with meaningful real-world applications
- 5. Use curriculum as their starting point to explore particular questions and interests
- 6. Receive yearly personalized letters detailing key strengths and growing edges or recommended areas of interest
- 7. Develop a connection with educators and volunteers

Goals of CHILDREN IN WORSHIP are for children (ages 5-11) to...

- 1. Learn to participate in worship and, with time, take on various responsibilities of worship leadership
- 2. Recognize and apply their spiritual gifts and talents
- 3. Practice prayer, mindfulness, and spiritual disciplines
- 4. Learn the meanings of rites and sacraments
- 5. Encounter scripture in age-appropriate language and interactive formats
- 6. Have adequate time to ask questions and explore answers
- 7. Develop a connection with volunteers and the worshiping community

Goals of YOUTH GROUP are for preteens and teens (ages 11-18) to...

- 1. Cultivate friendships with peers and welcome non-church friends to events and activities
- 2. Meet on-site and off-site to bridge the church and the greater community
- 3. Lead times of prayer and serve in outreach and missions
- 4. Recognize and apply their spiritual gifts and talents
- 5. Celebrate and support each other's extracurricular endeavors and personal achievements
- 6. Visit/support each other in times of crisis and healing
- 7. Develop a connection with youth leaders and volunteers

A New FPCNH Record For Bread For the World Letter Writing!

On Sunday, August 16 our church conducted an "Offering of Letters" during the Friendship Hour, writing to our federal senators and representatives, urging them to support federal food aid programs

Federal programs supply 95% of the funds that help feed hungry Americans. These funds have to be re-authorized every five years, and currently expire on September 30, 2015. Thus we to wrote in the summer, so our letters would arrive before the deadline.

We urged Senator Blumenthal and Senator Murphy to support reauthorization of full funding of federal programs for the next five years. New Haven area representative Rosa DeLauro has a bill (HR2660) that would raise eligibility from age 5 to age 6 for "women, infants and children" (WIC) food program. We thanked her for her initiative and asked her to continue to advocate for full financial support in reauthorizing feeding programs for another 5 years.



Congratulations and thanks to everyone who took time to write. We set a new record for FPCNH letters written—73 letters—13 more than last year!

Presbyterian Church (USA) Ministry Notes

During this interim period in the life of our church, it seems especially appropriate to be aware of news and developments within our wider denomination.

Early in August, the moderator of the 2014 General Assembly, Heath Rada, posted a letter highlighting some good news and developments concerning ongoing issues.

He starts out reporting the good news that two South Sudanese Presbyterian ministers who were arrested for their faithfulness have been released by the Sudanese government. Then he mentions how the denomination is addressing issues of racism. Funding for global mission, youth education, and denominational structure are among other topics addressed.
