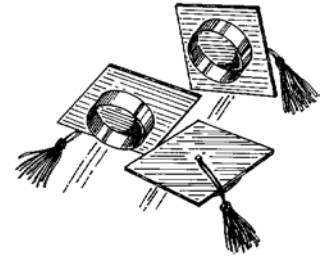

Graduation season is upon us and a number in our community are celebrating this educational milestone at the high school, and university levels:



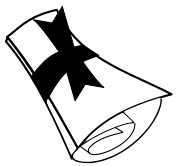
HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES:

Play & Pray Kids' Retreat

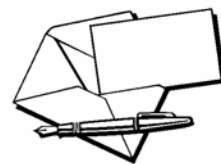

Is It Time To Write Congress?



Yes! That's why our Mission Committee is planning a Bread for the World offering of letters for Sunday, June 4th. In the next few weeks, Congress will be attempting to write the 2018 fiscal year budget and will be considering major changes to our income tax laws. Now is the time to affirm our personal values and those of our faith. That is a far more constructive activity than belatedly trying to reverse bad policies.

And yes, while this is a difficult political environment, there is room for optimism. At the end of April, this congress finally passed the 2017 budget, and that included the \$1 billion for famine relief that Bread's supporters had been seeking. And near the end of the previous session, partly responding to our letters last June and Bread's continuing efforts, Congress passed the Global Food Security Act, making permanent programs that have proven effective. Progress is possible.

It is important to remember that most Congress-people do want to do right, but they need support and encouragement. It's also important to remember that the seven members of our Connecticut delegation already understand the role government must play in addressing both global and domestic hunger. They, and their staffs, need to know they are appreciated.

Why write about hunger? Is this the most pressing issue? Hunger touches on many of the issues Christians care about -- poverty, homelessness, immigration, education, health care, foreign relations, guns v. butter among others. And so far, hunger has been a reasonably non-partisan issue with a good record of legislative progress.

Here's the ask. **Ask Congress to make funding decisions to put our country and the world on track to end hunger by 2030.** The choices our government makes regarding how it generates revenue and how it spends shared resources should promote hope, opportunity, and economic security for all people, especially those struggling to put food on the table. Within that:

1. Ask Congress to invest in and protect vital policies and safety-net programs — including WIC, global nutrition, SNAP, and refundable tax credits. For the first time since the start of the Great Recession in 2007, U.S. food insecurity and poverty rates declined in 2015 (latest data available), while both median household income and health insurance coverage increased. However, far too many of our neighbors continue to struggle to buy nutritious food. One in 8 Americans, including 1 in 6 children, lives at risk of hunger. Our nation's federal nutrition programs keep hunger at bay for more than 42 million Americans. Congress has proposed cutting or restructuring these programs to achieve budget savings. That must not happen. Congress needs to protect and defend federal nutrition programs against harmful structural changes and budget cuts.
2. Ask Congress to continue funding famine relief. Although Congress has allocated \$1 billion toward this in the 2017 budget, the need will be ongoing.
3. Ask Congress ask to support an increase in funding for international maternal and child nutrition programs in the Department of State foreign operations appropriations bill's global health account. \$250 million, twice the current amount, is needed. Ending hunger around the world is not just about providing people with enough food -- it is also about providing the right nutrients. Investments in nutrition have improved the health of millions of mothers and children around the world and has generated \$16 dollars for every dollar that is put toward global nutrition efforts.

That's a lot of "ask!" When you write, you may want to focus on only some of the issues, or write more than once to each of your Congress-people. If you want to consider these and many other issues in more detail, look around <http://www.bread.org/write-congress>

The Mission Committee is hosting a Bread offering of letters this June 4th. We'll have postcards and stamps and such. We know a number of you would prefer to write in the comfort of your home, so here are some practical details:

- Writing your "letters" be sure you include your physical address as that establishes that you are a constituent and is necessary for a reply.
- Envelopes are a problem. They delay delivery as much as a couple of months because they require that your message go through screening for harmful chemicals. (That's why we're using postcards.) If you want to use your personal stationery, the Mission Committee will hand deliver your letter (without envelope) to the district offices in New Haven (Rep. DeLauro) and Hartford (our Senators).
- Email is a great way to communicate. Use the Contact section on your Congress-people's web pages. You can also email via <http://www.bread.org/2017-offering-letters>, but your message will get more attention if you send it yourself.
- If you need to find your electeds, you can use <http://capwiz.com/pcusa/home/> The search function is well down the right hand column.
- If you write from home, please let Ralph Jones know. We do need to let Bread know about the success of our offering of letters.

Remember that the most effective advocacy is based on relationships. If you can, remind your elected that they have met you. Be friendly. Be personal. They know all the policy details already. It's your (our) stories about our experiences, our faith and why we care that really get attention.

So keep those cards, letters and emails going!
