

Holy Week and Easter Worship at First Presbyterian Church

Join us in worship during the month of April as we journey to Jerusalem to listen again to the story of Jesus' trial, crucifixion, and resurrection. The first two Sundays of April invite us into Jesus inner circle as he continues to teach, preach, and heal. Co-Pastor Bill Goettler will preach on April 3rd. The Sacrament of Holy Communion will be celebrated during worship. On Sunday, April 10th, YDS Intern Bryce Wiebe will preach. Following worship that morning, all are invited to remain in the sanctuary for a brief service of communion. The Rev. Steve Jungkeit will preside at the Table. During these two remaining Sundays in Lent, the preachers will draw from the sayings of Christian mystics, poets, and thinkers. These writings will be included in the Sunday bulletin and weekly Gmail.

Holy Week begins on Palm Sunday, April 17th with a palm procession at 10:30 a.m. The congregation will gather in the Owens Community Building to receive their palms before heading out across the front lawn and into the church building. Once inside we will be greeted by the great sounds of the organ as we take our seats in the pews. Co-Pastor Bill Goettler will be the preacher for the morning. New Members will be received, and the Sacrament of Holy Baptism will be celebrated. It will be a full morning, and a wondrous one!

The Maundy Thursday service will take place on April 21st in the Miller Gathering Hall. We will sit around tables to hear the story of Jesus shared meal with his friends, when he gives them the commandment (Maundy = Mandate) to love one another. The Sacrament of Holy Communion will be shared. The choir will sing, scriptures will be read, and prayers will be prayed. The service will begin at 7:30 p.m.

The Good Friday Tenebrae service of light and darkness, April 22nd, will also begin at 7:30 p.m. This service will take place in a candlelit sanctuary. The Passion of Jesus the Christ will be read, hymns sung, and we will watch the sanctuary grow dark. In the end, just the Christ candle will remain as Mattie Hatcher Long sings "Were You There."

An Easter Sunrise Service will take place at the summit of East Rock Park at 6:30 a.m. on Easter morning. Join friends from First and Summerfield United Methodist Church and Hamden Plains United Methodist Church as we share in the good news of Easter joy. The Rev. Sara Lamar-Sterling, Pastor of First and Summerfield UMC, will be the preacher.

Our own Easter rejoicing begins with an Easter Breakfast at 9:30 a.m. in the Miller Gathering Hall. Good food and lots of breakfast treats will be prepared. Sit with friends and family as together we ready ourselves to hear the good news of resurrection. The Easter service will begin at 10:45 a.m. with a string quartet prelude. Co-Pastor Maria LaSala will offer the Easter sermon. The sanctuary will be filled with Easter flowers, the choir will sing, and the congregation will lift their voice in song and in prayer. The service will conclude with the singing of Handel's *Messiah*. Jesus Christ is Risen Indeed!

Music during Holy Week and Easter

Music will play an important part in our services as we near Holy Week and Easter. Next Sunday, April 10, when we celebrate Earth Day, the choir will sing John Rutter's tuneful "For the Beauty of the Earth." On Palm Sunday we will process with palms into the church singing a hymn, and sing the traditional hymns and psalm for the day. The choir's anthem will be "Hosanna to the Son of David," by the contemporary composer Daniel Moe. Maundy Thursday will be unique this year: we will meet in the Miller Hall and sing and hear sacred music in the blues tradition during the worship service. In the Good Friday Tenebrae service we'll sing hymns of the Passion; Debbie Tenney will sing Samuel Barber's "The Crucifixion," and Mattie Long "Were You There?" On Easter Sunday the choir will sing the "Gloria" from Mozart's *Missa Brevis* in F Major, accompanied by a string quartet, and as always, we'll all join together in the "Hallelujah" Chorus from Handel's *Messiah* after the benediction.

During the 9:30 Christian Education hour, young and old alike, are invited to a morning of creative learning, in observance of Palm Sunday. Creative energy and yummy treats beckon you to this special morning ... we look forward to seeing you there.

One Great Hour of Sharing

On Palm Sunday we will join with Christian churches around the country in the One Great Hour of Sharing. This remarkable ecumenical humanitarian effort gives tangible evidence of our response to the call to give comfort to the hurting and to feed the poor, at home and around the world.



Funds raised in Presbyterian churches through One Great Hour of Sharing support three important programs of our denomination: Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, the Presbyterian Hunger Project, and Self-Development of People. Each Sunday throughout the year we hear of the actions and initiatives carried out in our name through these programs.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance responds to humanitarian crises caused by war or natural elements. Along with other faith-based organizations, it provides emergency shelter, food, water, and medical care wherever people are in great need and peril, from Haiti to Pakistan to Japan. By our contributions, we can assure that Presbyterian Disaster Assistance will have the resources to respond swiftly and effectively. Some of the OGHS funds were used in March to offer aid to our sister congregation in Ashaway, RI, after vandals destroyed their sanctuary and church hall.

The Presbyterian Hunger Project aims both to combat the immediate effects of starvation and drought, and to promote long-term self-sufficiency for local agriculture and food distribution, in our country and around the world.

Self-Development of People funds local projects designed to enable segments of society marginalized by poverty or ethnic discrimination to voice their concerns and organize to overcome the disadvantages they face. Groups as disparate as the Roma people—the so-called Gypsies—in eastern Europe and Hispanic parents of school children in New Haven have been aided through Self-Development of People.

Earth Day Celebrations!

April 10 will be a morning to remember the good earth of God's creation. Earth Day is typically celebrated on April 22. On April 10, our congregation will reflect on the wonder and the burden of having dominion and care for God's creation. The Children in Worship group will display the good earth collages they have been working on this month. The hymns will reflect our care for earth, sea, and sky. YDS Intern Bryce Wiebe will be the preacher for the morning.

Eco-Palms to be used on Palm Sunday

The Worship and Music committee decided that we would use eco-friendly palms this year. In Guatemala and Mexico, an effort is underway to develop a new structure for harvesting palms that protects the environment and also provides a fair income for the harvesters of the palms. Called Eco-Palms, the palms are harvested in a more sustainable way, whereby the harvesters are paid on the quality of the palms they harvest rather than the quantity, which helps to limit the amount of palms taken from the forest. These communities have taken upon themselves to learn about harvesting practices that minimize impact on the natural forest where the palm grows, and ways to protect this wild species of palm. In fact, in Guatemala, the palm harvesters have received SmartWood certification from the Rainforest Alliance, a "seal of approval" that ensures consumers that the wood products they purchase come from forests managed to conserve biodiversity and support local communities. Rather than sending the harvested palms off to a distant warehouse for sorting and packaging, the community members complete those tasks themselves and sell their palms directly rather than relying on middlemen—ensuring that more of the money paid for the palms actually goes to those who worked the hardest to provide them.

When done in a socially and environmentally just way, palm gathering protects valuable natural forests. Steady markets for palm prevent the forest from being destroyed for other uses. Eco-Palms protect the unique and important biodiversity of the region and maintain the local communities' standard of living.

Maria LaSala to attend DC Women's Health Lobby Day

Co-Pastor Maria LaSala will join hundreds of women and men on the steps of the nation's Capitol on Thursday, April 7th for a Rally for Women's Health. Maria is attending as a representative of the Clergy Advisory Board of Planned Parenthood. Planned Parenthood has once again been the target of attacks and federal funding cuts by a now Republican controlled House, aimed at restricting access to birth control, women's health care screenings, and sexuality education. Senators Richard Blumenthal and Joe Lieberman have stated publicly their opposition to federal funding cuts, but still need to hear from their constituents who support this position. Youth Group Mission Trip to Broad Street Ministries in Philadelphia!

Led by Micah Luce, Nancy McLaren and the staff of Broad Street Ministries (BSM), the group explored the issues of urban homelessness and hunger while also volunteering at BSM.

Youth Group Attention to Hunger

In the month of April, the Youth and Children of our congregation will learn about and respond to the ongoing issue of hunger in our city. Children ages three through ten are invited to bring canned goods to each of their Sunday School classes in the month of April, during which time the children will learn about hunger in New Haven. The goal has been set at **seventy-five food items!** We can do it! The canned goods will be donated to Christian Community Action at the end of the month. The youth groups recently returned from a service trip to Broad Street Ministries in Philadelphia, where they learned about the complex issues of homelessness and hunger. The experience, and pursuant conversations, led the group to commit to active participation in this year's **Walk Against Hunger**, to take place on May 1st in the East Rock neighborhood. The youth groups will aim to raise \$1000. Once we have achieved these goals of seventy-five food items, and \$1000 raised, this awareness-raising month will culminate in a special celebration on May 8th.

The Northern New England School of Religious Education

The Northern New England School of Religious Education (NNEsRE) has sponsored a summer intergenerational camp affectionately called Camp Winni for the past 95 years ago currently at the Geneva Point Center on Lake Winnepesaukee in central New Hampshire.

Camp Winni is an interfaith, interracial, family-oriented, and open community that shares a weeklong experience of living and learning. Each year they explore a new camp theme that is woven into the various educational courses, activities, worship, and music. There are program opportunities for spiritual development, socio-political awareness, artistic expression, personal growth and renewal. The camp philosophy directs us to bring newly acquired insight and knowledge back to our homes, places of worship and communities in a collective effort to make our world a better place.

Each day begins with a Morning Watch service followed by breakfast and then classes for all ages. Afternoons are open for rest, relaxation and recreational pursuits. The waterfront offers swimming, paddle-boats, canoes and kayaks. Following dinner and our Evening Watch service there are programs designed to provide fun for all ages, including folk dancing, storytelling, the “Hoot” talent show, a Coffee House, campfire singing, a drum ring, and much, much more.
