Pastor's Message

Dear FPCNH Community,

As a congregation, we are embarking on a period of discernment – and over the last few weeks, I've gotten a lot of questions about what a process of discernment looks like. So, I thought I'd spend a little time describing it – from my perspective.



First of all, one of the most beautiful elements of discernment is that it takes both intentional planning and openness to the Spirit – and these two elements dance together, like a magnificent waltz. We will have to take time to listen, to talk, to share, and to pray – we will have to be intentional about engaging in the process. And, as you are well aware, the Spirit will be at work in wild, wonderful, and mysterious ways. For people who like to plan – planners such as myself - it can be hard to work with such a partner. However, if we are open the Spirit nudging us, guiding us, presenting us with opportunities, and leading us forth and we may glimpse a clearer picture of the kingdom of God at hand.

Often times, a discernment process is compared to a strategic visioning process and while there are some similarities (looking to the future, understanding trends, setting goals), the lived experience is quite different when an equal partner in discernment is the Holy Spirit. We set goals but we cannot be rigid in our achievement of them. Experiential learning, flexibility, and communal decision-making will both guide and disrupt our path. Patience and the act of letting go will be required practices. "I don't know" will often be an answer to a question. The sensation of thrilling excitement will almost always come with at least some sense of fear and trembling – that's usually a good sign, in fact. The work will feel productive, even if there's not much to show for it yet. The loudest or most energetic of us will likely not dictate the outcomes – rather, this work will require everyone to put the community's passions and interests before our own individual ones. We'll be drawn in directions where energy lies, where opportunities arise, where we may have not gone before. We will experience a transformation.

We're going to start by dreaming of the world we believe God desires for us – and we'll go from there.

Congregational Meeting on Sunday, January 7, 2018

The Session has called a congregational meeting for this Sunday, following worship. The purpose of the meeting is to elect elders and no other business may be conducted. Below is information on the people who will be presented by the Nominating Committee for congregational approval to serve 3-year terms as Elders on Session.

Sue Balakrishnan and her husband, Ken, came to First Presbyterian Church 24 years ago, after moving from their home state of California. They and their children, Kevin (28), and Anna (25) have called First Pres home ever since. With a background in religious education, Sue quickly engaged in the Christian education at the church, serving as superintendent of Sunday school, and then Director of Christian Education, where she served for many years. Since leaving her position as CE director, Sue served on session as co-chairs of the clock committee, where she remains today. Sue currently works as a Special Education Paraprofessional at East Haven Public Schools.

Jennifer Ballew and her husband, Mark Lanz, were married at the First Presbyterian Church of Ann Arbor in 1998, and first began attending FPCNH in 2002, soon after relocating to New Haven from Michigan. DECEMBER SESSION REPORT

Report on the Session Meeting

December 19, 2017

One of the first important pieces of business that the Session considered was the proposed 2018 budget. David Miller was present on behalf of the Finance committee to answer questions and direct our discussion. Our budget for 2018 is about \$349,000 of which we are expecting about \$269,000 in pledges. This includes funding for a new Committee, the Communications committee, which oversees our online presence as well as signage and other communications. We are still receiving pledges and they will be reflected in next month's budget figures.

There were two overtures brought to us for discussion. The first overture is the 223rd General Assembly to instruct the Board of Pensions (who has charge over this) to include a 12 week Paid Parental Leave as part of the benefit package of employees covered under their plans. This would be available to all parents of new children regardless of how the child came into the family including birth, adoption, and fostering. The Session voted to approve this overture.

The second overture came out of the Mission committee which had received it from the Hudson River Presbytery. This Overture 006 directs the Board of Pensions and the Foundation to divest from fossil fuel and to seek out investments which center around renewable and/or energy efficient sources. After discussion, the Session voted to approve this overture.

Both of these overtures will now go to our Presbytery of Southern New England for consideration at its next meeting in February.

One final important discussion the session had concerned how we as a church invite people to become members and how to best invite and involve them in the work of the church. All our committees would love to have new members. We are in an exciting place now with our new pastor, JC and we welcome all ideas and suggestions from you. Our committees are: Christian Education, CLOC, Communications, Mission, Worship, Property, Personnel, Finance, and Stewardship. The current ruling elders are listed on the back of every bulletin and our pictures are displayed in the Copeland room. We are waiting to talk to you.

Facing Racism: A vision of the Intercultural Community, Anti Racism Study Guide

Are you thinking “I’m not a racist” but you see the racism pervasive in the every day interactions around you and you are also thinking about the multiple ways you benefit from racism – past and present? Speaking our own convictions now, with clarity and power, could make a tangible difference in the current struggle. 
